
DIAMOND DRILLING COMMENCES AT WODGER

HIGHLIGHTS

- Diamond drilling underway at the highly prospective Wodger VMS Prospect
- EM conductors identified from recent surface EM survey are coincident with significant Copper mineralisation
- Initial 400m diamond hole designed to test the northern EM plate positioned down-dip from aircore hole WRAC109 (**25m @ 1.1% Cu**)
- DHEM survey scheduled to enhance follow-up drill target testing

RNI NL (ASX:RNI) (to be renamed Auris Minerals Limited) is pleased to advise that access approvals have been granted and a diamond drilling programme has commenced at the high-priority Wodger prospect in the Bryah Basin.

Surface Moving-Loop Electromagnetic (MLEM) surveys were conducted over all prospects at the Forrest Project¹ (Figure 3) to enhance targeting (refer ASX announcement 15 March 2017). While several discrete conductive zones were identified at Forrest and Big Billy two weak EM responses were identified at the Wodger Prospect. These EM responses were processed by Southern Geoscience Consultants and are coincident with significant copper mineralisation defined from previous aircore drilling (refer ASX announcement 9 March 2017).




Figure 2 Diamond drill hole WRDD001 (ongoing) in relation to modelled EM conductors (projected to surface) and significant oxide copper mineralisation defined from previous drilling - Wodger Prospect.

This initial 400m diamond hole (Appendix 1 – Table 1) has been designed to test the northern-most EM conductor while evaluating the stratigraphic and structural controls on the oxide mineralisation at depth. The diamond hole will be drilled beneath the down-dip projection of 25m @ 1.1% Cu (WRAC109) (Figure 2) to test the modelled plate which is believed to be the fresh sulphide source.

Based on the information received from this hole, RNI has the ability to expand the drilling programme to test the second southern-most EM conductor as well as other geological, geochemical or geophysical targets.

While providing valuable structural and lithological information, this diamond hole will also form the platform for a high powered Down-Hole Electromagnetic (DHEM) survey to enhance follow-up drill target testing.

This initial drilling will take approximately two weeks to complete with a further 4-6 weeks for the receipt and analysis of assay results.

RNI Executive Director, Debbie Fullarton said “We are very excited that diamond drilling has commenced at Wodger and look forward to the data that this programme will provide.”

Corporate Update

Further to the ASX announcement on 7 April 2017 RNI's Board is currently progressing negotiations over competing transactions proposals and will provide all shareholders with an update on these proposals in due course. However no assurance can be given that a proposal or any other transaction will materialise.




Figure 3 RNI's copper-gold exploration and mining portfolio with highly prospective target locations.

1. The Forrest Project tenements (Figure 3) have the following outside interests:

 - ii. Westgold Resources Ltd (ASX:WGX) own the gold rights over the RNI interest.

ABOUT RNI NL

RNI NL is exploring for high-grade VMS copper-gold discoveries in Western Australia's highly-prospective Bryah Basin region and recently acquired Chunderloo area.

RNI has consolidated a 1,433km² copper-gold exploration portfolio in the Bryah Basin divided into five well-defined project areas – Forrest, Doolgunna, Morck's Well, Cashmans and Horseshoe Well. The Company's exploration focus is on VMS horizons identified at the Forrest-Wodger-Big Billy trend, the Cuba and Orient-T10 prospects

RNI's recent Chunderloo Mining Tenement acquisition consists of three mining leases that account for 14.05km² of highly prospective VMS tenure which currently holds a non-JORC compliant copper-gold resource of 22,000t @ 5.4g/t Au and 1.6% Cu at the Chunderloo Project (The estimates are historical estimates and are not reported in accordance with the JORC code. A competent person has not done sufficient work to classify the historical estimates as mineral resources or ore reserves in accordance with the JORC code and it is uncertain that following evaluation and/or further exploration work that the historical estimates will be able to be reported as mineral resources or ore reserves in accordance with the JORC Code).
